Greeted by the curator and a wine and cheese reception, enjoy our rich art culture as you explore the Group of Seven gallery of original works.

Group of Seven Walking Tour 3 Hours

Take a stroll through downtown Sault Ste. Marie with Blaq Bear Eco Adventures, and learn about the Group of Seven's connection to the area and how their work has inspired new age artists to explore the Algoma Region. The tour will start at the Art Gallery of Algoma with stops at the Agawa Canyon Train Station, finishing along Queen Street weaving through alleys to see several newly painted awe-inspiring murals created by local and world-renowned artists.

Moments of Algoma Time Varies

Download the "Moments of Algoma App" and curate a driving route to visit the Group of Seven interpretive signs in the area. Eight signs in the shape of an artist's stool and easel can be found within Sault Ste. Marie city limits, or you can embark on an adventure along the Lake Superior Coast where you will spot 6 easels between Sault Ste. Marie and Lake Superior Provincial Park.

Agawa Canyon Tour Train 10 Hours

All aboard this designated Canadian Signature Experience! A one day wilderness adventure that will take you 114 miles north of Sault Ste. Marie, over towering trestles, alongside pristine northern lakes and rivers, and through amazing granite rock formations that inspired Canada's famous Group of Seven artists. The large picture windows of your comfortable coach provide a great view as you learn through a GPS triggered commentary, the vast history of the Algoma Region.

During a stop in Agawa Canyon Park, enjoy a scenic walk along the Agawa River, and explore one of the four waterfalls found in the park, including Bridal Veil Falls painted by the Group of Seven. Or climb to the top of a stunning lookout platform 250 feet above the tracks.

Group of Seven in Algoma

The Algoma landscapes represent an early informative stage in the Group of Seven's encounter with the North. The members of the Group of Seven first painted in the Algoma Region in May and September 1918, at times traveling on the train at others traveling along the coast of Lake Superior. For all of them this encounter with Algoma in all its natural glory was a stunning sensory esthetic and even spiritual experience that had a profound impact on their development as world class artists.

The art created during this period offers vistas of Lake Superior and more focused images created in Algoma; these now provide the foundation for an immersive and interactive experience that can be shared by all who visit Sault Ste. Marie and the Algoma Region.
